When we look at an artwork, we can usually say, “This a painting” or “That is a sculpture.” However in contemporary art, there are some artworks that break all these ‘rules’ and look like a painting, sculpture and installation all in one.

Singapore Art Museum presents **Medium at Large**, an exhibition that looks at artworks often created by unusual methods and materials. These materials range from human hair, to whitening soap, rattan, oil paint, even to sound, text and language. In doing so, the works on show ask questions about people’s experiences, encounters and understanding of art.



DID YOU KNOW?

Marcial Bonifacio is the alias of Benigno Aquino, an opposition senator of then Philippines President, Ferdinand Marcos. Aquino was assassinated by a gunshot upon his return from exile in Manila International Airport, despite repeated warnings not to return. His death was not in vain as this assassination brought down the dictator Marcos.

DID YOU KNOW?

To many Cambodians, the stomach is where people feel the pain of war and poverty most strongly, as they were always hungry during these periods.

The artist Sopheap Pich wanted to convey this idea using a material that Cambodian people can relate to. The material used here is usually found in traditional Cambodian crafts and provided extra income for families. As this material is related to survival and preservation of heritage, the artist seeks to reconcile Cambodia's rich material culture with its history of war and poverty.

DID YOU KNOW?

Jean-Baptiste Greuze was born on 21 August, 1725 in Tournus, France. *The Charitable Lady* was painted in the 1750s and was done in the style of realism. Realism in painting means to paint objects as they are. Through vivid facial expressions and dramatic gestures, Greuze introduced a new idea that painting should relate to life and educate viewers on values such as filial piety and being charitable.

DID YOU KNOW?

In this artwork, the artist Gary-Ross Pastrana used commonly found materials in the Philippines to imitate the actual object. For example, the cassette tape and record are made of sawdust and glue. The picture frame is shaped from ashfall from the Mt. Pinatubo eruption, and the 'snow' that the boots are standing in is made from the stuffing of baby diapers.
